Career Accomplishments to Date:

- During the 2025 season at Bard, the men's volleyball team reached the program's best overall record (12-16) since 2011 and appeared in their first postseason tournament appearance since 2012. In addition, Ansel Waisler and Sidney Stein were honored with All-Conference awards. Waisler was also named the New England Volleyball Conference Rookie of the Year. The team led the conference in service aces, was second in overall digs, and third in total kills.
- As an assistant for Vassar, the men's volleyball team earned their first UVC title in program history & made an Elite 8 run in the NCAA tournament (2021).
