Angela Robbins, Carthage Central High School**

Angie Robbins is a volleyball coaching legend in the Frontier League. She began her career coaching at South Lewis High School during the 1989-1990 season. She followed that with her first season at Carthage in 1990-91 where she led them to a Frontier League Championship and Section III, Class “B” finals. She would go on to coach over 170 players in her long, storied career, spanning generations in many families over her 32 year career there.

Coach Robbins finished her career with a record of 435-190, including three consecutive undefeated seasons and Section III Championships. She also had 13 Frontier League Championships, 10 consecutive. She was named the 2014-15 Section III Class “A” Coach of the Year and was a 2018 New York State Women of Distinction Honoree. She was also the 2024 Hall of Achievement Honoree at Carthage Central.

In addition to coaching, Robbins also taught Health at Carthage for 32 years. She finished out her career as the high school health teacher as well as the coordinator for the Health Department. She was highly regarded in both her coordinator role and that of the Vice-President of the Teacher’s Union, a position she held for 17 years.

Diagnosed with ALS shortly after her retirement in 2022, Coach Robbins gained her wings in 2024. Beyond the success of her teams on the court, Coach Robbins taught the importance of family and community. She truly listened when her players needed to talk. Coach Robbins was a force. Former players, or their children, coach all over the country and have taken the things they learned from her into what they do.



It's powerful to see a person's impact resonate so profoundly through the lives they touched. Coach Robbins clearly left a legacy not only in the sport of volleyball but in the hearts and minds of her players. Whether it's a cherished quote or a long-standing tradition, those are the things that keep her spirit alive and serve as a testament to who she was as a coach and as a person.
